

April 8 - 16, 2022 Charity Randall Theatre Before this performance of *Emilia*, Pitt Stages and the Department of Theatre Arts joins the call for all artists, cultural workers, public officials, educators, administrators, community leaders, organizers, and engaged community members to open all public events and gatherings with acknowledgment of the traditional Native inhabitants of the land.

We want to recognize that this production was performed on the traditional, ancestral lands of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy (also known as the Iroquois Confederacy), particularly the Seneca who were one of the 5 (and later 6) Iroquois-language speaking tribes in the Confederacy, the Lenape (also known as the Delaware), the Shawnee, the Mingo, and earlier, the Osage, the Monongahela, the Hopewell, and others.

We are mindful that our lives here are possible because the land and lives of people native to this place were stolen. Colonialism and white supremacy have continually tried to erase Indigenous people of this land in the past and present. At this time there are no federally recognized Indigenous tribes in Pennsylvania due to colonialism displacement. Our lives here are also possible because generation upon generation (past, present, and future) of indigenous people in this nation and all over the world are respectful stewards of the earth and its resources.

Director's Note

I have been a fan of Shakespeare's works since my late teens. Through all my years of training and performance, I had never heard of Emilia Bassano Lanier until I was introduced to this play. I never knew that some speculated her to be the actual author of Shakespeare's works and to be the "Dark Lady" of the sonnets. How fun! As I read through the script and watched the original production of *Emilia*, my excitement about her grew and grew. I was witnessing a story being told by women and, in particular, by women of color. They were in period costumes, mixing classical ideals and aesthetics with contemporary culture and sensibilities. This intersection of gender, ethnicity, culture, and history further enhanced my desire to bring *Emilia* to Pitt's Theatre Department.

Stories are powerful. Stories give us the permission to create realities, to conjure the past, to escape present circumstances, and to honor those whose voices were silenced. Emilia Bassano Lanier's voice was silenced for hundreds of years. She was a woman of multi-ethnic heritage born in a time and place that was not favorable to people like her. She was brilliant. She was defiant. She was full of life. She inspired many around her. Unfortunately, her magnificent light was tampered down by societal rules, bigotry, and prejudice. Despite it all, she was determined to make her voice be heard. In effect, she became the first woman writing in English to publish a substantial volume of poetry.

Lastly, this production is a celebration of finally being able to be back in a theatre, creating and experiencing live performance! It has been an utter joy to work with all the actors, designers, technicians, and scholars who have been involved in the creation of this massive show. What started as a little flicker of an idea has now morphed into a roaring fire of a theatrical experience. I hope you are able to be inspired by Emilia's passion and the passion of these wonderfully dedicated young artists.

About the Author

Morgan Lloyd Malcolm is a playwright and screenwriter. Her play *Emilia* (Shakespeare's Globe, 2018) transferred to the West End the following year. Her play *Belongings* premiered at the Hampstead Theatre and Trafalgar Studios (2011) and was shortlisted for the Charles Wintour Most Promising Playwright Award and her play *The Wasp* at Hampstead Theatre also transferred to Trafalgar Studios in 2015. In 2013 she was chosen as a member of the Soho Six (Soho Theatre). She has co-written several acclaimed immersive site-specific plays with Katie Lyons, produced by Look Left Look Right, including *You Once Said Yes, Above and Beyond* and *Once Upon a Christmas*. She was part of the writing team for four of the Lyric Hammersmith's pantomimes from 2009-2012 and wrote (solo) the Bolton Octagon's Christmas plays for 2013 and 2014. She has written two large community plays for the Old Vic New Voices: *Platform and Epidemic*.



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Dramaturg's Note

There is not much to say that Morgan Lloyd Malcolm has not written into the lines of this play, so I will open and close this note with the words of this magnificent playwright.

To Open:

"This play was written to be performed by an all female cast of diverse women. It would not be the same play if this is ignored...

This play was also written to challenge the notion that a play about a person needs to be a vehicle for one actress. This is very much an ensemble piece hence the three Emilias. It takes place in several time zones at one time. It isn't an accurate representation of Renaissance England, it isn't a historical representation. It is a memory, a dream, a feeling of her."

This play is the story of the Elizabethan woman Emilia Bassano. History will tell you who she is in terms of the men she came across: Shakespeare's "Dark Lady," Henry Carey's mistress, Simon Foreman's client. This play will tell you who she was in her own right and who she is to us now. Emilia Bassano was not just a wife, a mother, a mistress, a lover. A woman's story is not comprised of the men around her. Emilia Bassano was a trailblazer and fierce defender of her sex. Her book, Salve Deus Rex Judæorum, published in 1611, was the first volume of poetry ever published by an Englishwoman and is considered by some scholars to be the first-ever feminist publication in England.

Salve Deus Rex Judæorum is an extremely smart body of work. The constraints of the time would not allow for women to own their own property, their own ideas, their own voices, their own selves. Emilia Bassano defied the odds with her book. Hidden inside a retelling of the passion of Christ is a feminist scream that demands to be heard. In Salve, Emilia champions female leaders of the past and of legend, calls out patriarchal oppression, and encourages women to get educated and question authority. She presents a woman's consent as a fundamental right and a personal power to be wielded. She was a passionate woman who refused to be held back by the

patriarchal society of her time. She refused to be judged by the color of her skin. Emilia's story is one that transcends time; one that speaks to all generations of women and especially to women of color. It is almost 400 years later, and women are still expected to be quiet and agreeable and nothing less than perfect. To bend to the whims of others. To do as we're told. To sit silently and to let ourselves be abused. We are living in a time where, on average, women make \$20,155 less than men per year, and Black women make \$4,448 less than that. 400 years ago, Emilia risked fatal consequences just to have her voice be heard. Today, you do not need to risk death to make your voice heard. Do not let yourself be silenced.

To Close:

"The house that has been built around you is not made of stone. The stakes we have been tied to will not survive if our flames burn bright. And if they try to burn you, may your fire be stronger than theirs so you can burn the whole fucking house down."




