Note from the director:

Theatre has evolved from telling stories around the fire to big budget productions with the best of everything. The Pandemic changed it all; the lights went down, productions stopped, and theatres closed.

Theatre is experiencing another evolution. Through social media, mankind has found a way to continue to tell stories far and wide while peering into a computer screen, tablet, cell phone or laptop.

The theatre's storytellers, the playwrights, have adjusted to this format and are they writing work for the online platform that continues to examine the human condition. Niccole Nero Gaines' plays "Black and Blue", and "Hair Waiting", touch on these conditions in personal ways. These Zoom calls offer glimpses into discussions where we learn that the struggle is real, and having a dialogue is key to beginning the hard conversations that could teach us about one another.

An Important Message:

Before we begin this stream of Miss You Like Hell Pitt Stages and the Department of Theatre Arts joins the call for all artists, cultural workers, public officials, educators, administrators, community leaders, organizers, and engaged community members to open all public events and gatherings with acknowledgment of the traditional Native inhabitants of the land.

We want to begin this first step of engagement by recognizing that this production was recorded on the traditional, ancestral lands of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy (also known as the Iroquois Confederacy), particularly the Seneca who were one of the five (and later six) Iroquois-language speaking tribes in the Confederacy, the Lenape (also known as the Delaware), the Shawnee, the Mingo, and earlier, the Osage, the Monongahela, the Hopewell, and others.

We are mindful that our lives here are possible because the land and lives of people native to this place were stolen. Colonialism and white supremacy have continually tried to erase Indigenous people of this land in the past and present. At this time there are no federally recognized Indigenous tribes in Pennsylvania due to colonialism displacement. Our lives here are also possible because generation upon generation (past, present, and future) of indigenous people in this nation and all over the world are respectful stewards of the earth and its resources.

The CROWN Act

Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair

The CROWN Act, which stands for "*Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair*," is a law that prohibits race-based hair discrimination, which is the denial of employment and educational opportunities because of hair texture or protectivehairstyles including braids, locs, twists or bantu knots.

First introduced in California in January 2019 and signed into law on July 3, 2019, the inaugural **CROWN Act** expanded the definition of race in the Fair Employment and Housing Act (FEHA) and state Education Code, to ensure protection in workplaces and in K-12 public and charter schools. Since then, **The CROWN Act** has galvanized support from federal and state legislators in the movement to end hair discrimination nationwide.

The CROWN Coalition is an alliance of organizations, including founding members Dove, National Urban League, Color Of Change and Western Center on Law and Poverty, that are dedicated to the advancement of anti-discrimination legislation across the United States. With the help of a diverse array of organizations in the social justice, business, legal, and education sectors, the **CROWN Coalition** has had tremendous success elevating the public narrative around this important issue and inspiring a movement to end hair bias and discrimination.
